Combined heat and power (CHP) technology holds enormous potential to improve the nation's energy security and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Texas has a long and successful history with CHP. With more than 18,000 megawatts of CHP capacity, **Texas ranks #1** in the nation in recycling waste heat. CHP can double its benefits to Texas in the future if appropriate public policies are combined with better education.
